

From Rabbi Cutler's desk

January 15th would have been Martin Luther King Jr.'s 92nd birthday. Instead, on January 15th we remember him because his young life was taken too soon. He was an agent for positive change – equal voting rights, equal education, etc. He not only risked his life, was jailed, beaten, and marched to liberate the African American community, but he marched and risked his life to bring about justice and equity to all Americans. As Jews we benefited from his legacy because just as racism would no longer be tolerated, anti-Semitism will not be tolerated.

However, it only seemed to have lasted a few generations because today, sixty-three percent of millennials and Gen Z'ers don't know that 6 million Jewish people were killed in the Holocaust, according to a September survey commis-



It's a problem: Fifteen states require Holocaust education as part of secondary school, yet last year in Florida (one of the required states), a principal refused to call the Holocaust "a factual, historical event."

In 2018, there were 1,879 recorded attacks against Jews and Jewish institutions, according to the Anti-Defamation League. That's the third-highest year on record since the 1970s, when they started keeping records of such attacks.

And the shootings:

- •The Pittsburgh Tree of Life synagogue mass shooting in 2018 killed 11 and wounded six.
- •Last year, a gunman opened fire at a synagogue near San Diego during Passover services, killing one and wounding three.
- •In Germany also last year, a "heavily armed" gunman live-streamed anti-Semitic taunts as he tried to force himself into a synagogue on Yom Kippur. He then killed two people at random outside.
- •Last month, four people died (including the assailant) and 15 people were wounded in a shooting in the heart of Vienna, Austria, near the city's main synagogue. It's unclear whether the attack was targeting the place of worship.

Last month, the only Anne Frank memorial in the U.S. was vandalized. Swastikas and the words, "We are everywhere," were found affixed to the statue.

We all know the security concerns at Beth Israel.

Nearly two-thirds of U.S. millennial and Gen Z'ers do not know basic information about the world's biggest genocide.

I guess it should not have been such a shock to read that on TikTok, Jewish creators have reported "they experience anti-Semitism nearly every time they post content to the platform, regardless of whether or not the content is about their Judaism," as reported by NBC News' Kalhan Rosenblatt in September. "I think just like on any other platform, anti-Semitism on TikTok comes from a place of ignorance," said Rosenblatt. "Some forms of anti-Semitism appear to be trolling and genuine bigotry used in an attempt to get a rise out of Jewish users. Some others, seem to be young people who are ignorant or misguided and would likely change their behaviors with greater education."

Some examples of comments, she reported: A nose, shower and gas pump emoji (referring to gas chambers in the Holocaust), and the comment "Heil" with an emoji indicating a Nazi salute.

This is not just TikTok. With billions of monthly active users, "Facebook's policies still do not specify Holocaust denial to be hate," Jonathan A. Greenblatt, CEO and national director of the Anti-Defamation League, wrote for USA TODAY in January, calling for Facebook to ban Holocaust denial. YouTube, Twitter, and even Amazon grapple with how to handle rhetoric and products on its platforms.

I want to be clear: Being a Jewish American does not present struggles like being Black or Muslim in today's world. When I see the police, my prevailing feeling is not fear. But what we can learn from the past can apply directly to the present.


Genocide, concentration camps, things people joke about as if they're long gone or never existed – are ongoing today. In Northwest China, as many as 3 million Uighur Muslims, out of a population of about 11 million, may be in concentration camps in Xinjiang, according to the U.S. Department of Defense.

Rhetoric, memes, comments – people listen. NBA Hall of Famer Kareem Abdul-Jabbar wrote for The Hollywood Reporter in July, admonishing recent anti-Semitic comments from celebrities like Ice Cube, Chelsea Handler and DeSean Jackson:

"These famous, outspoken people share the same scapegoat logic as all oppressive groups from Nazis to the KKK: all our troubles are because of bad-apple groups that worship wrong, have the wrong complexion, come from the wrong country, are the wrong gender or love the wrong gender. It's so disheartening to see people from groups that have been violently marginalized do the same thing to others without realizing that perpetuating this kind of bad logic is what perpetuates racism."

On January 15th when we celebrate the legacy of Martin Luther King, let us remember his famous words: "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality.

Once again on the actual birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. (Friday January 15th) Beth Israel will hold its annual Unity Shabbat even during this difficult time. Once again various faith traditions will be represented (albeit social distancing and mask wearing) to affirm the legacy of Martin Luther King. We come together as many different religious traditions to work together as one to ensure that justice and equity for all. Rabbi low

To be responsible, children must notice what needs to be done, think of useful options, and take pride in their contributions.

Here's how to encourage responsibility.

Notice and Narrate

Draw attention to strategies that work. "Moving your puzzle to the table is a good idea. It's easier to keep track of the pieces," "You and your sister made up great rules."

Ask instead of tell

Support your child's independent actions. Ask, "What's a safe place to put your cup?" instead of saying, "Put your cup on the counter." Note, "I see toy cars in front of the stairs. Where should they be moved?," instead of insisting, "Someone could trip on the cars. Please move them."

Put your child in charge

Ask questions that inspire your child to solve problems. "We need a good way to get everyone to the table for dinner. What do you think we should do?" and "We need to find a better place for the boots (bikes, socks, mittens, toys) so we can find them easily. Where do you think they can go?"

Celebrate success

When you notice your child being responsible, show your appreciation. "Hurray! All the coats got hung up today." "Awesome work setting the table! Dinner was very elegant," "Thanks for putting the snack wrappers in the garbage. I loved working on a clean counter."

I hope you find these suggestions helpful. It is amazing when you don't always jump in and think for a child, the power that you are giving to your child to accept responsibility.


